SECAmb have engaged and partnered with Asthma Networks in Surrey and Sussex to assist in reducing health inequalities for CYP living with asthma, as part of CORE20PLUS5 workstream.

Shared and discussed clinical guidelines to understand our practice

Sharing of CYP Asthma data with Asthma Group to identify volume and breakdown

Engaging in Education – eLFH and lectures from subject matter experts for our staff

Advanced Practitioners delivering extended scope in asthma care in line with Tier 2 of The National Capabilities Framework for Professionals who care for Children and Young People with Asthma - health **Education England**
